This is a summary of how we deliver music education to all our pupils across three areas - curriculum music, extracurricular provision and musical experiences - and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education during the academic year 2025-2026.

### Curriculum Music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that our pupils can achieve.

Music is taught in class every week and is informed by the model music curriculum (March 2021). Lessons are a minimum of 45 minutes and are taught by class teachers. Teaching is supported by specialist planning, and the Kapow curriculum scheme of work. This musical learning is further supplemented by weekly singing assemblies in each key stage, lasting 15 minutes.

All music lessons provide pupils with opportunities to:

- Listen to and evaluate music from diverse time periods and cultures.
- Learn how to create and control sound using their voices, as well as tuned and untuned instruments.
- Understand how music is communicated through various notation systems.
- Improvise and compose music.
- Perform musically in front of audiences of varying sizes.

An instrumental scheme is also delivered by our Year 3 and Year 4 teachers and gives pupils an opportunity to learn the glockenspiel for a prolonged period, allowing them to develop technical proficiency on a single instrument. Each year group completes 3 half termly units across the year totally 30 weeks of tuition over this period.

Spring 1: Singing	Learning to sing three folk songs and using voices and body percussion.	Performing a folk song and composition as a group.
Spring 2: Contrasting dynamics	Using vocal sounds and instruments to create space soundscapes.	Performing a space soundscape and sharing space symbols as a group.
Summer 1: Structure	Using instruments to perform different sound patterns.	Performing sound patterns as a group using instruments.

### Extra-Curricular Music

Opportunities for singing and playing music outside of lesson time support pupil progress beyond the core curriculum.

At Wavendon Gate School, we currently offer individual and small-group lessons on guitar, violin, keyboard through MK Cooperative. Teachers visit the school and teach pupils in our dedicated music room (The Studio).

We also offer group rock and pop band lessons through iRock. The band leader visits our school and teaches children in our dedicated music room (The Studio). Pupils can learn to play the drums, keyboard, electric guitar and to sing. Older students work towards accredited music exams.

Pupils in year 5 and 6 take part in the Young Voices concert series each year where they perform at The O2 Arena, London and sing a variety of genres, with 1 song in a different language. Performances in the past have included Latin, Welsh, Swahili, Italian and Korean. Pupils attend weekly rehearsals for this from September to February each year.

We have a thriving Lower School Choir which meets during the autumn term and rehearses weekly. This year they will be performing at the end of the autumn term for the residents of a local care home.

Individual and small group lessons are funded by parents, however for those children who are Pupil Premium, these lessons can be funded by the Pupil Premium provision.

Lower School and Young Voices Choirs are free to attend and accessible.

Children will have the opportunity to perform or experience high quality music this academic year. Please see below for a list of those opportunities:

- Pupils in Foundation perform a nativity each year.
- Pupils in Year 6 perform a leavers' musical.
- Pupils in Years 1-5 perform a class musical assembly each year to pupils and parents.
- All pupils that receive instrumental tuition perform to parents once a term.
- All pupils that take part in iRock lessons perform to parents and pupils every term.
- Pupils from Years 5 and 6 perform at The O2 Arena as part of a choir of over 8000 pupils each year.
- Lower School choir will perform for the residents of a local care home during the autumn term.
- Key Stage 2 pupils have visited Milton Keynes Theatre to watch professional shows and musicals.
- Pupils in Year 1-6 watch a M & M Productions annual pantomime with live performers.
- BLMK Music Hub teachers visit school annually to perform live for pupils in small group ensembles.
- Pupils in both upper school and lower school choirs are invited to perform at St Mary's Church, Wavendon in an annual carol concert.
- All of the pupils will watch a performance from Electric Umbrella, a performance group made up of adults with learning disabilities.
- All of our SEND pupils will be involved in the Electric Umbrella performance and KS2 SEND pupils will take part in workshops with them.
- Pupils in year 4 have been invited to perform with Electric Umbrella and pupils from mainstream and SEND schools in a performance to promote inclusivity at St Alban's Cathedral.

Wavendon Gate School is committed to continually enhancing musical offerings to pupils. Below are the improvements we plan to implement in the coming years. We welcome your suggestions and encourage you to contact the school if you have any ideas on how we can further improve our musical opportunities.

In future years, our Music Development Plan aims to achieve the following:

- Introduction of a wider range of instruments on offer for small group or individual lessons.
- Further develop performance opportunities for our young musicians throughout the school year.
