

R&W - What makes some texts sacred?

authoritative	Trusted as being accurate or true.
canon	A collection of texts that are considered to be the authoritative scriptures of a religion.
divine	Connected to God or gods, often seen as very special or powerful.
holy	Related to God or religion, considered special and to be respected by followers.
oral tradition	Cultural and historical traditions passed down by word of mouth.
revealed	When something is shown or made known that was previously hidden or secret.
sacred	Something that is greatly respected and treated with care, especially in religious contexts.
scripture	Books and writings which followers of a worldview may consider to be holy or special.
value	How important or useful something is considered to be.

Most organised religious worldviews have some form of scripture or authoritative text which followers read, listen to or hear talks about to help them understand their worldview and make life choices.



After ten living Gurus who provided spiritual leadership, the tenth Sikh Guru bestowed the Guruship to the Guru Granth Sahib forever. It contains teachings from various Gurus as well as writings from select Hindu and Muslim teachers, which the Gurus included. It is considered the highest spiritual authority for Sikhs, and is treated as a living Guru to demonstrate this belief.

Texts may be considered sacred or holy for different reasons, including origin, source, language, contents and culture.

There are many Hindu texts considered to be sacred or authoritative. These may be considered to be shruti (divinely revealed) or smriti (remembered and passed down).

In the Buddhist worldview, there are many texts collectively called the Buddhist Canon. Texts vary between different traditions. Buddhist scripture may be referred to as Dharma.
